## Color guard at World Series

America's favorite past time, recently interrupted by terror, began its conclusion Saturday when members of the Fort Huachuca Select Honor Guard carried the flag during the National Anthem at the opening game of the World Series at Bank One Ballpark in Phoenix.

Amidst a record-breaking crowd of 49,646 baseball fans, the joint color guard, made up of representatives of the Army, Air Force, Navy, Marine Corps and Coast Guard, marched out in 90-degree desert weather to show Arizona and the nation its American pride.

Game 1 of the World Series, pitting the Arizona Diamondbacks against defending New York Yankees, opened with a military pomp and circumstance. As recording artist, Jewel, sang the National Anthem, the fort's joint color guard, along with airmen from Luke Air Force Base, completely silenced the crowd at Bank One Ballpark with drill formations and demonstrations.

Fireworks burst into the sky during "the

rocket's red glare," of the National Anthem, while servicemembers stood fast with the United States colors, reenacted the raising of the flag in Iwo Jima, and displayed an enormous U.S. flag across the baseball field.

Fort Huachuca's joint color guard carried

flags from all five services in addition to the national colors and the Arizona state flag. Two riflemen rounded out the nine-man formation. The Phoenix Fire Department marched along with the fort's joint color guard. The servicemembers from the Air Force, Army, Marine Corps and Navy are all stationed at Fort Huachuca. The Coast Guardsman is assigned to a Reserve recruiter unit in Phoenix.

"We are always proud to serve our nation," said Staff Sgt. Michael Boggs, platoon sergeant of the Fort Huachuca Select Honor Guard, "but being chosen to participate in the opening game of the World Series is a particular honor."

The Diamondbacks were glad to take advantage of an offer put forth by United States colors bearer Staff Sgt. Donald Chausse, Select Honor Guard squad leader. Chausse called the Diamondbacks and explained how the approximately 30 service members serve the Fort Huachuca Select Honor Guard. They actively participate in a number of ceremonies throughout the year to include changes of command, parades, memorial services and rendering honors at military funerals. The Diamondbacks called back asking the joint color guard to open

## Carson & Barnes 5-ring big top circus Sets up tent on Fort Huachuca, Nov. 14

The smell of cotton candy, the feel of sawdust beneath your feet — the whistle sounds, the overture plays, and the performance begins!

That age-old routine will be repeated twice on Nov. 14, at 4:30 and 7:30 p.m., when the "Biggest Big Top on Earth" appears at the Fort Huachuca Special Events Park on Kelsay Avenue. This event is sponsored by Kiwanis Club of Sierra Vista and Fort Huachuca's Morale, Welfare and Recreation.

In America today there remains only one big tented circus that manages to maintain the traditional demanding schedule of one-day stands. It's the "Viva Espana" edition of Carson & Barnes 5-Ring Circus.

Carson & Barnes erects its city block long big top in the traditional style, using 20 elephants just as was done over a hundred years ago.

Early circus morning, parents and grandparents are invited at no charge to bring their children to watch this grand display.

Over 100 exotic and domestic animals are unloaded and in just a few hours an empty field is transformed into a circus fantasyland.

This year's show has a variety of acts, all described as "center ring caliber." For the first time ever, two teeterboard troupes will somersault to twin human pyramids — six man high. South American daredevils spin simultaneous double wheels of destiny at the absolute apex of the big top! Carson & Barnes' famous el-

phants this year feature Baby Jennie, the one and a half-year-old precocious pachyderm and undisputed star of the show.

Stellar attractions include the comedy act of 'Princess Roxanne and her Almost-human Gorillas'; three troupes of "perch pole perfectionists"; the brilliantly costumed "Viva Espana" Grand Parade, and a 40 person aerial ballet.

Of course, clowns, horses and daring trapeze acts take part in this most traditional big top circus remaining on tour.

Outstanding animal acts include Nubian lions and Siberian tigers, camels, llamas, ponies, African and Asian

elephants, and a center ring of horses. They are part of the Liberty Horse act composed entirely of Friesian Stallions, a rare breed of horses marked by broad bodies, long flowing manes and tails.

An old-fashioned Midway opens one hour before the first show. Advance tickets are available at a reduced price in Sierra Vista at Chamber of Commerce, Safeway and Po Folks; or on Fort Huachuca at MWR Box Office, MWR Rents and Desert Lanes.

## 3<sup>rd</sup> annual MI Heritage run successful, fun

More than 230 service members and civilians ran or walked in the 3<sup>rd</sup> Annual Military Intelligence Heritage Run, Oct. 27.

Events included a 10K, which featured many hills, and a 3K fun-run. The 10K began in front of Rodney Hall, wound 6.2 miles around Fort Huachuca and concluded at the end of Brown Parade Field.

The runner with the best overall 10K time was John W. Kuhn, of Company A, 305th Military Intelligence Battalion, who ran the race in 40:52. The overall female winner was Jennie Wilson, who ran the 10K in 48:30. Team 1, Company E, 309<sup>th</sup> MI Bn., won first place in the battalion division with a time of 49:49. Company C, 304<sup>th</sup> MI Bn., came in second with a time of 50:52 and Team 2, Company E, 309<sup>th</sup> MI Bn., came in third place with an overall time of 51:13.

The top three overall 3K winners were Siouxsie Owen, 14, who came in at 12:47, Melisa Rios, 20, of Company E, 309<sup>th</sup> MI Bn., who came in at 14:46 and Russell Sin, 10, who ran the race in 15:09.

Steve Sin, commander of Headquarters and Headquarters Company, 111<sup>th</sup> MI Brigade and race director, said more people participated in the event than what was anticipated. "It wasn't until the week prior to the race that registration picked up," Sin said.

"I would like to thank all the individual runners, teams and units that participated in the race. It was great. It would not have been possible if it weren't for everyone's participation and support. Generous unsolicited donations of some of the local and national businesses such as Fry's Food Mart, Safeway, One Hour Martinizing, *Runner's World*, and Active.com also made a great difference to this event," Sin said.



"We have a well rounded team. Our players have the speed, strength, and we play smart," Key said. "We have a strong defense and a strong offense. We don't have any weaknesses."

Company D, 40<sup>th</sup> Signal Battalion suffered a rough loss on Oct. 25, losing to the 306<sup>th</sup>.

"Not to discredit their offense, but we had our worse game of the season," said Michael

Payne, player/coach, Company D, 40<sup>th</sup> Sig. "Even though their quarterback is very talented, it was our third game that week and three of our key players were injured."

Key said HQ, 306<sup>th</sup> comes as a surprise to many of their opponents.

"Because we're the only MI team in the A league – the rest are signal – and normally we only have eight to 10 players for each game, people look at us and think we're no good. They really make a mistake when they do that," Key said. "I looked at this team at the beginning of the year and I recognized that we have the personnel to win the whole post."

All final A league games will be played Friday at Brock field starting at 5:30 p.m. The championship games will kickoff Monday, giving the top four teams additional Commander's Cup points on top of the initial participation points. Each division will compete separately, when playing for points.

The Commander's Cup is awarded toward the end of the fiscal year to the unit that obtained the most points in various athletic competitions.
