## Fun Day Frolic Volksmarch set for September 22

The Directorate of Morale, Welfare and Recreations (MWR), Recreation Services Division (RSD), Sports and Fitness Branch in conjunction with the Thunder Mountain Trekkers will offer a self paced 5K, 10K and 15 K Volksmarch walk on September 22.

The start and finish point for all courses will be at the La Hacienda. Check-in will begin at 6:30 a.m. and the walking trails will open at 7 p.m.

Two 5K trails will be available. The first trail is rated number one, to accommodate families with children and strollers and Trekkers who would like to take an early morning leisure stroll. This course will also accommodate wheelchairs. The second 5K course is rated four, allowing for a moderate to difficult walk due to substantial hilly climbs, steep descents and narrow paths. This trail is not recommended for children, strollers and wheelchairs. Both the 10K and the 15K walks are rated at four.

All of the scenic walking paths are certified through the American Volkspport Association and rated to accommodate beginners, families, leisure trekkers and the most devout Volksmarch enthusiasts desiring a more challenging trek.

Individual awards will be given at the finish point check-in table. The cost to register is \$7 for the 5K leisure walk, \$9 for the 5K challenge walk, and \$12 for the 10K and 15K.

The boys bowled two, four game blocks and after the first four he had finished 10th out of 61. He went back and bowled the next four and finished 11th with a handicap series of 1704. This was good enough to qualify for match play.

Continuing further, the fourth match was won with a 204, the fifth with a 204, the sixth with a 209 and the seventh match won with a 217. ## Empire Ranch Roundup

### BLM release

The Empire Ranch Foundation, a partner with the Bureau of Land Management, will host its annual fall "Empire Ranch Roundup" on Sept. 15, from noon to 5:30 p.m. at the BLM's Las Cienegas National Conservation Area. The foundation is dedicated to the restoration of historic structures.

The family-friendly celebration of the history and culture of Arizona ranching will take place 60 miles southeast of Tucson. The event will feature demonstrations of western horsemanship, livestock herding dogs, western music, Mariachi singers, folkloric dancing, livestock branding, horseshoeing, rope and reata making. Paul Bond will be on site with examples of his celebrity boots.

Concurrently with the Roundup is the Empire Ranch Foundation Western Art Sale at the Northern Trust Bank of Arizona in Tucson. The art show features art of more than 40 artists from across the country. Proceeds from the art sale benefit the restoration of the ranch site, one of the oldest working ranches in southern Arizona. The conservation area is part of the BLM's National Landscape Conservation System, which includes national monuments, national scenic and historic trails, wild and scenic rivers, and wilderness and wilderness study areas. Other partners of the Roundup are the Arizona Historical Society, the Sonoran Institute and the Northern Trust Bank of Arizona.

The event is free and open to the public. To access the Las Cienegas NCA, take I-10 east to exit 281. Go south on State Highway 83, turn left after Milepost 40, about 18 miles from the I-10 turnoff. ## Fishing Report

### SOUTHERN WATERS

**TUCSON URBAN** - The urban lakes, Silverbell and Kennedy have been stocked with channel catfish. There will be no further catfish stockings until mid-September. Due to poor water quality, Lakeside has not been stocked since May. Use worms, chicken liver or prepared catfish bait. The urban lakes also have been stocked with aggressive, fast growing, tasty, hybrid sunfish. Baits for sunfish include worms, mealworms, corn, or bread balls. Use a small hook, size 10 or smaller, under a bobber set at three to five feet. Buy a two-pole stamp and try different baits to double your chances.

**RIGGS FLAT** - Has been stocked with trout, and the weather is cool. Trout fishing has been fair.

**CLUFF RANCH** - Fair for warm water species (bass, catfish, sunfish and crappie).

For lake information call (520) 485-9430.

**ROPER LAKE** - Slow for all species. For lake information call (520) 428-6760.

**DANKWORTH POND** - Fishing has been slow for all species. For lake information call (520) 428-6760.

**KEARNY LAKE** - Fair to good for catfish at night using chicken liver, worms, hotdogs or prepared catfish bait.

**ARIVACA** - Anglers should be aware that harvest regulations on largemouth bass have been restricted to catch and release only on all largemouth bass caught at this lake. Surveys last week show fair numbers of small bass, but very few fish exceeding 12 inches. Average bass size is seven inches. No other fish stockings are planned until the water quality stabilizes. Due to elevated mercury readings in the warm water species it is recommended that these fish not be eaten until further notice.

**PENA BLANCA** - Bass fishing is good.

With the warm weather, the best fishing is at night. Surveys show a healthy bass population with good numbers of fish in the 15 to 18-inch range. Use artificial worms in rocky areas for largemouth bass. Good for sunfish. Try worms in shady areas. Due to elevated mercury readings in the warm water species, it is recommended that these fish not be eaten until further notice. Catch-and-release should be practiced. For lake information call (520) 281-2296.

**PATAGONIA** - Good for warm water species; bass, sunfish and catfish. The best fishing is at night. Artificial worms, spinner baits and crankbaits fished close to structure should get results for bass. Good for flathead catfish, try live sunfish or shad. Also good for channel catfish, try worms, chicken liver, or prepared catfish bait. Try worms in shady areas for sunfish. For lake information call (520) 287-6063.

**PARKER CANYON** - Fishing is slow

for warm water species (bass, catfish and sunfish). Try artificial worms or night crawlers. The limit on northern pike has been removed and all northern pike that anglers intend to keep must be killed immediately. Anglers are encouraged to try to catch this illegally introduced species. For lake information call (520) 455-5847.

**PICACHO RESERVOIR** - The water level is very low, no fishing reports available.

**ROSE CANYON LAKE** - Rose Canyon was stocked with rainbow trout last week and fishing has been fair to good. Try Power Bait, corn or cheese. Small spinners should also catch trout. For lake and camping information call (520) 749-8700.



# German Armed Forces Proficiency Badge Competition set

This annual competition, sponsored by the German Army Liaison Office here, provides soldiers an opportunity to earn a Bronze, Silver, or Gold German Armed Forces Proficiency Badge.

To earn the GAFPB, each soldier must accomplish four different tasks.

The first qualification is a fitness test, which includes different track and field events. Soldiers who meet the standards in the track and field events, and are certified by their company commanders, will move on to the following events:

A Mandatory Swim takes place from 7:30 a.m.- 4 p.m., Oct. 13 and from 7:30-11:30 a.m., Oct. 14.

The 111th Military Intelligence Brigade, USAIC&FH will conduct the Mandatory Swim event of the GAFPB Competition at the Barnes Field House swimming pool.

Uniform for the swimming event is a swimming suit. The mandatory swim event start times will be staggered by units throughout the day to prevent long waiting times.

Qualification with the 9 mm Pistol is scheduled for Oct. 20 and Oct. 21, from 7:30 a.m. – 3 p.m. The U.S. Army Garrison, U.S. Army Intelligence Center and Fort Huachuca will conduct the Pistol Qualification event of the GAFPB

Competition. Uniform for the range is BDUs, LBE, ear plugs, and kevlar helmet.

A road march will start at 5 a.m., Saturday, Oct. 27. The 11th Signal Brigade, USASC will conduct the Road March event of the GAFPB Competition.

Uniform for the road march is BDUs, LBE with water containers, ruck sack with 22 lbs of weight, and soft cap. Weight for ruck sack must be personal gear, i.e., no weights, rocks, or water containers.

All road march participants must be at the Range Control Office parking lot by 5 a.m., Oct. 27.

## Beware of flash flooding

Camping and hiking are two excellent recreational activities for a family or other group. There are camping and hiking opportunities right here on Fort Huachuca. If you have never camped with your family, this may be the time and place to try it. MWR will rent camping gear and the Sportsman Center will issue a camping permit for Lower Garden Canyon at \$3.00 per tent per night.

Select a time for camping when clear skies are forecasted. A rained-out first camping trip could put you off camping for life. Choosing a safe campsite is a very important first step.

Select a campsite away from waterways or other low areas that may be subject to flash flooding. Examine trees along waterways to determine how high past waters have risen by observing grass caught on limbs or water marks on trees. Pick a campsite well above those high-water marks.

Avoid camping near a single tall tree. Camp in a grove of equally tall trees instead to avoid a lightning strike. Since many flash floods occur at night, prearrange a meeting place should any emergency occur during the night.

Remote hiking trips, especially into slot-type canyons, require careful attention to weather predictions in the area.

Heavy rains ten or fifteen miles from your location could collect and rush toward you without any warning.

Use caution during seasonal rains such as our monsoon. Plan an alternate hike if weather threatens.

If you observe clouds forming nearby or hear thunder, vacate the area immediately as floods may be coming your way.

Before going out camping or hiking, talk with others who have knowledge about the trip you are planning. Also listen to weather forecasts as trip time approaches.

Check with the state or federal agency responsible for the land you plan to use to learn of any restrictions or recommendations governing your trip.

Children are fascinated with flowing streams. Recent high water may have undermined the stream banks that may give way. Recognize the potential dangers for your outing.

Inadequate planning could result in a tragedy on your conscience. Let someone know where you plan to hike or camp, and when you expect to return.

## Wear of the green service Cap/Hat ends

In a message to the field Monday, Army Regulation 670-1, September 1, 1992, Wear and Appearance of Army Uniforms and Insignia, and Headquarters Department of the Army letter 670-01-1, June 14, 2001, Subject: Beret Wear Policy were changed.

This message announces the elimination of the Army Green Male Service Cap (also called the saucer cap) and the Green Female Service Hat (also called the pot hat) as optional headgear for the Class A and B Service Uniforms.

When the Beret Wear Policy was published, wear of the Green Service Cap/Hat was limited to ceremonies or official duties, if such wear was prescribed by the

commander.

Further review of the policy resulted in the decision to eliminate the Green Service Cap/Hat as an optional uniform item, due to its infrequent wear and the financial burden incurred by soldiers who purchased and maintained this headgear.

Effective immediately, the message states "soldiers will no longer purchase or wear the Green Service Cap/Hat; this includes officers, warrant officers, and enlisted personnel. Soldiers who have not been issued the Black Beret will wear the Garrison Cap with the Class A and B Service Uniforms, until they receive their Beret."

The blue and white Service Caps/Hats will remain the prescribed headgear for the Blue and White Dress and Mess uniforms.
