

The 111<sup>th</sup> Military Intelligence Brigade will host the 4<sup>th</sup> Annual MI Heritage Run Nov. 2, at 8 a.m.

Register prior to Oct. 21 for the early registration fee of \$1 or \$12 for a long sleeve MI Heritage Run T-shirt. Registration after Oct. 21 is \$15.

The run is meant to foster competition, provide a fun event for soldiers, families, and community members of Fort Huachuca and surrounding areas, and to commemorate Veterans' Day. The units will be competing for "The Best Running Unit Award" and "The Best Unit Esprit De Corps Award." Judges will be stationed throughout the run route to score the units on their dress and alignment while running and their esprit de corps and motivation.

Activities throughout Oct. 26 continue until late afternoon. Activities resume the morning of Oct. 27 after breakfast. Youths will be divided into groups according to age, with about 8-15 youths per group.

Each youth will receive many items including: T-shirts, hats, turkey calls, Frisbees, books, and be eligible for a free raffle of numerous prizes donated by various merchants. Youths also receive a free one-year JAKES membership in the NWTF. JAKES (a jake is a young male turkey by definition) is an acronym for Juniors Acquiring Knowledge, Ethics, and Sportsmanship.

## U.S. holds off South African team, takes CISM golf title

FORT BLISS, Texas — The United States held off a challenge from South Africa during the final round Oct. 5 to claim the CISM North American Regional Golf Championship here.

The CISM, or Conseil International du Sport Militaire, sanctions international military championships in a variety of sports.

Canada and South Africa joined their U.S. hosts for this tournament, in which officials said the emphasis was on cooperation and camaraderie, rather than competition.

The U.S. team consisted of the top golfers from the U.S. Armed Forces Golf Championships which ended at Fort Bliss Sept. 28. The Army won two of the top three individual categories during the championships.

Pfc. Christopher Douglas from Fort Bragg, N.C., shot a 3-under-par 69 on the

final day to become the overall Armed Forces winner and take home the title in the open division. Mark Johnson, a lieutenant colonel from Fort Sam Houston, Texas, garnered the Army's other individual title in winning the senior division by a whopping 13 strokes. His 4-under-par 284 easily beat the Air Force's top contender. Six open golfers and the top four golfers each from the senior and women's divisions made the U.S. team that faced other 14-member teams from Canada

and South Africa.

For the CISM tourney, team points were awarded on a 3-2-1 basis for the first three rounds Oct. 2-4. The U.S. team won each round to assume a 9-5 lead heading to the final round, with Canada third holding 4 points. However, the team points possible doubled for the final round, meaning South Africa could have tied the U.S. team at 11 and forced a playoff, if they'd won the last round to earn 6 points.


