'All in the family'

Company B, 305th Military Intelligence Battalion, edges out Company E, 10-9

Company B, 305th Military Intelligence Battalion edged out Company E, 305th MI Bn., Monday 10-9 for the title of post Commanders Cup softball champions.

The intense game went from one extreme to the other with the crowd alternating between anxious silence and loud, boisterous cheers.

The final run was made by Company B at the bottom of the ninth in a game that kept fans on the edge of their seat and made some of them leap to their feet.

Until the first four innings of the game, neither team scored but Sgt. Tom Funkhouser got the ball rolling for Company B and came across the plate to give the team their first run.

During the fourth inning both teams brought in four runs, then power-hitter Staff Sgt. Eric Bigness hit a bat-smacking home run that gave Company E the lead of 6-4.

Company B's Spc. Frank Widner, who is the team's third baseman, hit two home runs during the game which were morale boosters for the team and for the crowd.

Staff Sgt. Al Escalante, Company B's coach, said the team lost only one game dur-

ing the season and ended with a record of 19 wins and one loss.

"We never gave up no matter what the score was. We just believed in ourselves and did what we had to do in order to win," Escalante said.

Escalante said his team's strengths are a mixture of good hitting and strong defense.

Staff Sgt. Robert Collins, Company E's coach, was also pleased with his team's performance this season.

Company E ended the season with 17 wins and three losses.

"I was extremely happy. We started off the season with one win and two losses and went on to win the rest of our games," Collins said.

Scorpions sting opponents 27-17 during opening of Commanders Cup playoffs

The Headquarters and Headquarters Company, United States Army Garrison Scorpions defeated Company D, 305th Military Intelligence Battalion, 27-17, May 28 during the opening week of the post's Commanders Cup softball championships.

The season started in March and going into the playoffs the Scorpions had a record of 12-7, entering the tournament in the sixth seed.

"We had a great game. This was the type of effort I've been expecting all season," said Sgt. Cuahutemoc Fernandez, the Scorpions' coach for the past four years. He said his coaching style is open and he believes in asking for input from the players. "I take input from everybody," he said.

"The seven games that we lost this year

are more than the games we have lost during the three previous years," he said, shaking his head.

"It was somewhat frustrating because I know we have a talented team and that it was just a matter of time before we came together. I think that our coming together was a matter of everyone becoming comfortable with each other," Fernandez said.

"We didn't beat ourselves. We made the team earn the runs," Fernandez said. He said the team's power hitters, 1st Sgt. Arnold Flores, Staff Sgt. James Hall and Sgt. Shane Winemiller and the team's offense contributed to the success of the season and of the game. "We were really coming around with the stick," Fernandez said of the 27 runs the team earned. The Scorpions ended the season with a six-game winning streak but lost to the Noncommissioned Officers Academy Friday.

Promotion points through e-learning courses

Are you aware that you can earn promotion points for your vendor-based e-learning courses? According to PERSCOM Enlisted Promotions Branch, promotion points are valid under military education for completion of vendor-based e-learning courses. Course completion with credit hours must be reflected in ATRRS prior to awarding promotion points.

Promotion points are awarded under the same guidelines as correspondence courses (five training hours = 1 promotion point).

So, which e-learning courses does this apply to? SkillSoft is a distributor of interactive server-based training software that offers thousands of hours of SmartForce programming. Some of the things that SmartForce offers are 1500+

to include information technology and business/leadership courses, mentoring, user forums, news and articles, case studies, technical documents, seminars, lab exercises and books and white papers.

It can be viewed as a companion to eArmyU, or you can use it for transition to the private sector. It can also be coupled with existing job requirements, be it directed or self-development. You also receive certificates for each course completion.

And all of this is at no cost to you if you are Army active duty, Army National Guard, Army Reserves, or DA civilian.

Registration for this training software has been automated with the Army Training Requirements and Resources System.

ATRRS will verify your eligibility for the program and it will also post successfully completed courses to the user's official ATRRS training record.

To register, go to the Web site of <https://atrrs.army.mil/channels/eLearning/smartforce/>. Once you are on this Web page, click on the Registration through ATRRS link and this will take you to the ATRRS SmartForce

Training Application Web page. You will need to enter your AKO Username and Password in order to register for SmartForce courses.

To get credit for a SmartForce test, students must obtain a score of 70 percent or higher to pass. The nice thing is there is no penalty if a student fails a test. This means that you can take the test again if you do not make 70 percent the first time. If you would like to see a catalog of the courses that are available in the SmartForce Computer Based Training, just click on the link to SmartForce Course Catalog at the above-mentioned Web site.

SkillSoft also has a free monthly Army newsletter. To receive a copy of the newsletter, send your request by e-mail to Army@smartforce.com.


