MPs want community to stay safe, use shuttles, enjoy concert

Making sure everyone stays safe during the Lonestar and Tammy Cochran concert will be the number one priority for Fort Huachuca's military police Saturday.

"Even though we are expecting a large crowd, we will still meet force protection needs. Concert-goers should not be concerned about security. We want the public to come on post and enjoy the show," said Sgt. 1st Class Mel Dennis, military police operations sergeant.

He said National Guard soldiers will help to monitor

gate access and security forces from Davis Monthan Air Force will be on hand during the concert also.

Dennis went on to note shuttle buses will be to transport concertgoers to and from the concert.

"It's the most advantageous way to get there, frankly it's the best way to go. It will make things easier and smoother for concertgoers," Dennis said.

Pick-up points will be located at the Greeley Hall and at the La Hacienda parking lots. He said concert-goers are urged to access Fort Huachuca through the East Gate and asked that the community exercise patience.

The public consumption of beer and alcohol will be limited to the concert area and will only be sold in plastic or paper cups, Dennis said. Glass or aluminum containers, and coolers of any type will not be allowed during the concert he noted.

Pets are also restricted from the concert unless they are Seeing Eye dogs.

He also said pets should not be left in vehicles and the MPs will follow the guidance of Arizona Revised Statutes if they come across one.

"The MPs do not want to see any pets left in vehicles, simply keep them home for the night," he advised.



Post softball team wins 21-16

The Fort Huachuca softball team, the Buffalo Soldiers, defeated the "Crue," a Sierra Vista team made up of all civilians, Friday 21-16 at the Oscar Yrun Community Center in Sierra Vista. They are currently 4-1 this season and won their first out of town tournament during the Wilcox Cinco De Mayo Invitational Saturday.

Staff Sgt. Al Escalante, an instructor on post, is the head coach and is enthusiastic about the abilities of his team. He's been playing softball for approximately nine years and coaching for three.

"We have good base-hitters and power-hitters. We play strong defense. I think we have a good team all around. This is not a beer-belly team," Escalante said laughing. They currently have 17 players on the roster.

"Most of the players, who are all soldiers, also play for

their units and the majority of these guys are playing three or four nights a week. They love it," Escalante said. During practice they conduct drills that improves situational hitting, focuses on fielding and enhances quickness and agility.

Sgt. 1st Class Ralph DuBois, a Fort Huachuca instructor who was an All Army softball player from 1997-1998, said, "We tried

for two years to get a post team going. We are so thankful to have the Morale, Welfare and Recreation division behind us 100 percent," DuBois said. He said this is the first post softball team in nine years.

Mike Wallace will be the substitute driver for Jerry Nadeau in the No. 01 U.S. Army MB2 Motorsports Pontiac, it was announced.

Wallace, 44, will be filling in for Nadeau, who is recovering from injuries sustained in a practice crash May 2 at Richmond International Raceway.

Nadeau was upgraded to fair condition today by doctors at the Virginia Commonwealth University Medical Center. He was previously listed as serious, but stable. He has been moved out of the intensive care unit into a private room. Doctors say his vital signs are normal and he continues to show improvement. Nadeau suffered head, lung and rib injuries.

Wallace's first race in the U.S. Army car will be The Winston Open, May 17 at Lowe's Motor Speedway.

"We're appreciative that Mike has agreed to drive the U.S. Army car during Jerry's absence," said Jay Frye, general manager of MB2 Motorsports. "Mike has a vast amount of experience and we're confident that he will do a great job. This is a difficult time and we are fortunate to have a veteran like Mike, who will help all of us get through it."

Bicycles, skateboards and roller blades are also prohibited during the concert.

Dennis also said the only bags allowed into the concert area will be purses and diaper bags.

The following is a list of prohibited weapons:

- Any weapons or explosive that can't be processed lawfully under federal or state law
- Weapons that shoot more than one shot at a time by a single function of the trigger
- Rifles with a barrel that

is less than 16 inches

- Shotguns with a barrel less than 18 inches
- Knuckles of all types (brass or dusters)
- Blackjacks, slapjacks and hand sandbags
- Zip guns
- Switch or slide blade knives
- Knives with blades three and a half inches long or over when carried concealed
- Switch or slide blade knives
- Any type of weapon carried in a concealed manner
- Num-chuks or other

fighting sticks

- Any type of exploding or dangerous burning device.
- "If we see any of these weapons at the gate, we are going to confiscate them. Don't even bring them on post," Dennis said.

"We want everyone to really have a good time and to be safe. We are definitely taking the appropriate and necessary steps to ensure a safe environment for everyone to enjoy the concert and Fort Huachuca. It should be a great time for all," Dennis said.

Commissary Awareness Month in May

May is the second annual Commissary Awareness Month, but many of America's armed service members are deployed overseas. Is that like having a party that no one can attend?

Never fear. "Deployed service members may not need to worry about trips to the commissary, but educating military families and new arrivals about commissary shopping is more important now than ever," said Kaye Kennedy, chief of corporate communications for the Defense Commissary Agency.

"Guard and Reserve personnel are being activated in increasing numbers, sometimes losing a higher paying civilian paycheck. The changes can be traumatic, both emotionally and financially."

Normally, Guard and Reserve personnel can shop in the commissary a maximum of 24 days per year. During active duty they receive full military benefits - including unlimited commissary privileges.

"The opportunity to save 30 percent or more at the commissary can help families living near a commissary," said Kennedy. "But first we need to get the savings message to them." Savings for a family of four shopping regularly in a commissary can amount to over \$2,400 per year.

"Commissaries worldwide take the opportunity to give special focus to outreach efforts during Commissary Awareness Month," said Kennedy.

"We not only make a special effort to reach Guard and Reserve, but new active duty, spouses and families, and single service members as well.

Many stores hold commissary tours with single service members to let them know the commissary is not just for those who are married. Single service members often don't realize commissary awareness month they can obtain substantial savings in frozen and convenience foods, snacks and beverages and health and beauty products."

Military family outreach is also an important element of Commissary Awareness Month. Tyson, Minute Maid, Heinz, Clorox, Kellogg's and Keebler have teamed up for a "Salute to the Military Family" promotion with the National Military Family Association, a volunteer organization devoted to defending military families and their benefits.

The special promotion will provide additional savings to commissary customers on name brand products and participating manufacturers will donate operating funds to NMFA. In conjunction with the promotion, most commissaries will have limited-edition boxes of "Frosted Flakes" featuring NMFA's 2002 Very Important Patriots. The VIP Program recognizes exceptional military community volunteers.

"Commissaries are an essential benefit and a focal point of the military community," said Kennedy.

"We encourage organizations that support military families, singles, Guard and Reserve and retirees to contact your local store director if you want to arrange a group tour, or if you simply want to obtain more information to pass along to those who may not realize the value of their commissary benefit. That's what Commissary Awareness Month is all about."

Commissaries change coupon rules

Commissaries will start enforcing new policy revisions June 1 that limit coupon use to only one per item unless otherwise specified on a coupon.

"We still gladly welcome the use of coupons. We're only limiting the number of coupons a customer can use per item to what is specifically stated on the coupons. If the coupons state more than one per item can be used, then we'll accept them. If it doesn't, then we'll accept only one per item," said Bob Vitikacs, the Defense Commissary Agency's executive director for operations and product support.

The revised DeCA policy more accurately reflects manufacturers' intent for coupon use, which has always been one coupon per item unless otherwise stated, Vitikacs said. DeCA policy had allowed commissaries to accept multiple coupons unless specifically stated as only "one per item."

Under the new policy, customers can still take advantage of multiple couponing, but only through sales specifically allowing the practice.

Customers can watch for advertising and in-store flyers to learn about these sales, and manufacturers will continue to provide coupons in the stores.

Wading pools are authorized
