


The two-part event included a pre-judging show that was held at 9:30 a.m. and a night show.

Avrien along with Cecil Anderson, 9, the son Staff Sgt. Millicent Anderson, MEDCOM, has been selected to attend the International Model and Talent Association's Convention in

New York, from July 19-28, with the Tucson Modeling Group. IMTA models include soap opera star Farah Fath and model Kate Holmes, who has appeared on the cover of "Cosmopolitan."

"Avrien really likes it. She has grown so much as a person. She's starting to learn at an early age how to take good care of herself and how to invest in her body for a lifetime," Anderson-Hack said. "She enjoys reading but she's started to come out of her shell more. She wants to

be an actress, a veterinarian, or me when she grows up, so I can't complain," Anderson-Hack said laughing.

Avrien has attended the Barbizon Institute, multiple events through ProScout and is currently listed on Models.com.

Anderson said her son Cecil became involved in modeling after they attended an event to lend moral support to Avrien at model-search that was held at a local Sierra Vista hotel. They both attended a modeling workshop over spring break in California.

Anderson said her son took to modeling pretty easy and that she plans on supporting him. "He had wanted to be a doctor but now he wants to become a model or an actor. As long as he continues to get good grades, and wants to succeed, I'll continue to support him," Anderson said. He's also started taking piano lessons, which Anderson said has given him an extra measure of discipline and helps him to focus. "He's a lot more outgoing and tries out for more events now," Anderson said.

Soldier wins local competition, to compete in June

2nd Lt. Malida Ruiz, 86th Signal Battalion, won first place in the lightweight body building division and came in second place in the Ms. Fitness competition during the 20th Annual Mr. and Mrs. Arizona Copper Classic, Saturday.

She began training specifically for this event in January by working out twice a day. The closer she got to the competition, she began to follow a strict diet.

She ate soups for two weeks for the carbohydrates and protein. After that she started eating brown rice, beans, and plain chicken breasts. She said that for her, it helped to decrease fat.

She usually does an hour of cardiovascular conditioning and that includes the Stairmaster or power-walking.

"Power-walking 'cuts' your legs up and helps to give them definition. Running decreases leg size," Ruiz said.

She advised those who don't have a workout partner to watch themselves in the mirror.

"I enjoy seeing myself steadily improve

and seeing my body go from one level to the next, but when I look in the mirror while I'm working out, I'm checking my form. If you don't have proper form, you are doing more harm than good. Some people may think you are conceited, but who cares," she said laughing.

Her next competition will be the National Physique Competition, which is in June and will be held in Dallas. If she wins, she will be qualified as a professional bodybuilder and will be able to have sponsors and to compete for cash prizes.

Ruiz said once an athlete earns their pro-card, they are able to compete in the Mr. and Mrs. Olympia competitions, which is one of her ultimate goals.

"One of the things that drives me to succeed is that I feel parents should be their child's role model, not some rock star. I feel good that my children can point to me on stage and say 'That's my mommy,'" she said.

She also believes that it's good for others to realize that the Army offers people an opportunity to pursue their dreams and their lifetime goals and that "the Army is about more than just going to work and going

DISCOVER your future career goals

Do you know what you want to do when you grow up? Or when you get out of the Army? Do you want to change jobs and you are not sure what you want to do?

There is a web site that can help you decide what you might be interested in for a career or look for a school that offers what you want to study. The program at this web site is called DISCOVER.

The DISCOVER program offers help in five different areas. These areas are: Inventories, Occupations, Majors, Schools and Job Search

In the Inventories section you can take three different types of inventories. The interest inventory helps you find a career which best suits your interest.

The abilities inventory compares what you estimate your abilities to be. The values inventory suggests which careers are likely to contribute to your work satisfaction.

The Occupations section lets you search occupations by Alpha List, Keywords, Major, Military Experience, Characteristics, Hot Occupations, Military Occupations and Military Information.

In the Hot Occupations, you can look up careers by Highest Salary, Fastest Growing, or Largest Number of New Openings. In the Military Occupations it list the different occupations and tells you which Armed Services you can find that field in.

And if you are getting out of the military you can find what civilian occupations are equivalent to the job you had in the military.

In the Majors section you search for majors by Alphabetical List, by keyword or by Occupation. One part of the majors is a list of schools that offer the major you are interested in.

For the Schools section you can list schools by state, specific major, or keyword. If you are looking for a school that offers a specific type of degree, you can do that by Degree type.

Or if you are looking for a type of school, you will do that by School Type. You can also search for a school that meets specific needs. There is also a section to learn about scholarships or financial aid.

In the Jobs Search section you will learn



how to write a resume, cover letter, and prepare for a job interview. There are also sections for finding job openings, Internships or apprenticeships.

In order to use this program, you need to get a User Id token so that you can sign into the DISCOVER web site.

You can get this User Id token at the Army Education Center, building 52104.

You can check in at the front desk and they will assign a token to you or have you see the computer specialist who will assign a token for you. You can use this token wherever you have access to the Internet for 90 days.

If you are going to be using the computers at the Education Center, you will need to read the Rules and Regulations for using government computers.

After reading the rules and regulation, you sign in and we place you on a system.

There you can access the Internet and go the DISCOVER web site.

If you want to print out any of your results or information, please bring your own paper. Or you can save your results to diskette. If you bring a diskette, we will need to scan it for viruses.

The web site to go to for the DISCOVER Career Guidance Program is <http://www.act.org.discover.login>.

Once you get to the login page, you will type in your user ID token and submit it.

Once you are in you will be asked to create a password.

You will type the password in twice and then submit that. You are now in the DISCOVER Career Guidance Program. Have fun looking through this web site. For more information, call the Education center at 533-1019.




