
A prominent officer in the 10th Cavalry during the 1916 Punitive Expedition was Major Charles Young. He was the fourth black graduate of West Point and a veteran of the 9th and 10th Cavalry and the 25th Infantry. In Mexico he led the 2d Squadron in two key actions which earned him the rank of Lieutenant Colonel. In 1917, just before his retirement, he was promoted to Colonel and commanded Fort Huachuca. 





Augustus Perry Blocksom, (1854-1931), Major General. As a 2d Lieut. commanded Company D, Indian Scouts, at Fort Huachuca, February 1881. As a lieutenant colonel commanded 6th Cavalry and Fort Huachuca in June 1911. He commanded the 34th Division during World War I.



Captain Charles Trumbull Boyd, of the 10th Cavalry was killed in action while leading his troop at Carrizal, Mexico, on 21 June 1916.



Col. William Carey Brown. Commanded the 10th Cavalry and Fort Huachuca from 1914 to 1916, and led the regiment into Mexico during the Punitive Expedition. Later as a Brigadier General he would serve in Europe during World War I. The parade field on Fort Huachuca's Old Post is named for him.



Esther Buchanan Smith, postmistress of Fort Huachuca from February 1920 to May 1921. She came to Huachuca in 1908 to live with her aunt, Ida Carty and succeeded her as postmistress upon her aunt's death. She resigned in 1921 to go to Fort Leavenworth to marry Capt. Bailey G. Brig. Gen. Eugene Asa Carr, (-1910). A Civil War Medal of Honor holder, Carr Peak in the Huachuca Mountains is named for him.



Chaplain Louis A. Carter, a lieutenant colonel who served with the 25th Infantry Regiment at Camp Stephen D. Little in Nogales in the 1920s and at Fort Huachuca in the 1930s. His efforts on behalf of the education and welfare of black troops will be long remembered.



Carrie Anna Clark, postmistress at Huachuca from 1890 to 94. She died in 1921 and is buried at the post cemetery.



Col. Arthur V. Corley, commanded the garrison from 1972 to 1977.

Malin Craig, (1875-1945), 1st Lt., 4th Cavalry. His father, 2d Lt. Louis A. Craig, 6th Cavalry, was first Quartermaster of Fort Huachuca from 1877 to 1878. His sister Helen Mar Craig, was the first baby born at Fort Huachuca, in April 1877. He would become Chief of Staff of the U.S. Army from 1935 to 1939.

Colonel Charles Albert Phelps Hatfield, (1850-1931). As a captain, 4th Cavalry, served at Huachuca from 1884 to 1888 and participated in the Geronimo campaign. He was breveted Major for gallantry in action in the action with Geronimo in the Santa Cruz Mountains on 16 May 1886. From 1912 to 1914 he commanded the 13th Cavalry and the 2d Cavalry Brigade at Naco, Arizona.




