

## 49 Myer Elementary School students participate in SV elementary school cross-country championship meet

49 Gen. Myer Elementary School fourth and fifth grade runners were among the more than 400 elementary school participants from six local schools who participated in the Sierra Vista Elementary School Cross-Country Championship Meet on Nov. 9, at the Sierra Vista Middle School.

Fourth grade girls were led by Ashley Silva in 16th place in a time of 13:30 followed by Ashley Biski in the 19th with a time of 13:46. Huachuca Mountain won the race with 27 team points while Myer came in fifth with 122.

Fifth grade boys finished third overall with 76 points while Town & Country finished first with 52. Myer was led by Brennon Church in 14 with a time of 11:225, Brent Roberts in seventh with a 10:55 and Jerceel Wherry in sixth with 10:54.

Forth grade boys placed five runners in the top 14 places to take the team championships with 30 total points. Juan Venterua finished 14th in the 11:51, Justin Ulrich placed sixth in 11:13, Troy Gibson fifth in 11:11, Ash Drake fourth in the 11:07 while John Mercer became the city champion with a time of 10:39.

Fifth grade girls placed five runners in the top 13 place place to repat as city champions with 33 points. Kristian Chesleigh finished 13 in the 12:49, Courtney Olson, 10 in 12:21, Jordan Green seventh in 12:12, Maria Bowman second in 10:52 while Gabby Jackson defended her city championship to take first place in 10:20.

## R. L. Anderson Special Events Park dedicated Friday

The Directorate of MWR will dedicate the Special Events Park tomorrow to commemorate R. L. "Tiny" Anderson, the previous chief of MWR Recreation Services Division. The ceremony will begin at 5:00 p.m. and is open to all who wish to attend and honor Mr. Anderson. The Special Events Park, which is located behind La Hacienda on Kelsay Ave., will be renamed the R. L. "Tiny" Anderson Special Events Park. Anderson's wife, Lois Anderson, will be the guest of honor.

Anderson served as the Chief of the Recreation Services Division at the time of his death and had been the project officer for all MWR special events at Fort Huachuca for many years. He was directly responsible for successfully bringing large music concerts to the area.

Anderson was honored with 25 years of government service in November 2000. He began his military career in 1982 and was honorably discharged from active duty in the Army's Signal Branch. His last active duty assignment was with the 19th Signal Company at Fort Huachuca. After leaving military service, Anderson continued federal service, working his way up the MWR ranks from his first position as a procurement clerk in 1982.

Anderson was born Jan. 24, 1952, in Santa Rosa, California, but spent most of his youth in Ohio. Anderson joined the Army while a resident of Carlisle, Ohio in 1978.

Anderson was an avid bowler, and bowled his first 300 league play

## Arizona Game & Fish Department's area fishing, wildlife report

An angler visiting Big Lake hit major pay dirt recently, claiming to catch trout (or get a hit) on every cast. The trouble, he said, was fighting through all the small ones to get to the three and four pound rainbows, brookies and cutthroats. There are also reports of three-to-four-pound trout being caught at Long Lake east of Flagstaff. This is also the tail end of the bushy-tail season - squirrel season closes Sunday, Nov. 25.

Urban Lakes - Fishing for catfish has been good at all lakes and is really picking up. Cooler temperatures should make for great fishing conditions.

Catfish are biting best on stink baits, but worms, hot dogs and shrimp also work well. Fishing for sunfish has been good using mealworms and earthworms and a small bobber. Largemouth bass fishing is fair. Trout will be stocked on Monday, Nov. 19.

Tempe Town Lake - Due to warm weather and warm water, the first stocking has been delayed until Nov. 26 between 3:30 and 4 p.m. with a fishing clinic following - come down and join us.

Lake Pleasant - Lake level is at 48 percent of capacity. A fisheries survey last week found good numbers of white bass all over the lake with some stripers mixed in. Anglers still catching stripers and whites with spoons.

Largemouth have been slow; Carolina-rigged lizards and drop-shotting are the best bet. Catfishing remains good on livers, mackerel and water dogs in the main lake in 20-30 feet. Crappie fishing is slow.

Roosevelt Lake - Lake level is at 23 percent. Bass fishing has been fair, mostly "unders" but still a few "overs" coming in. Largemouth and smallmouth are still hitting cranks and plastics. Crappie fishing has been fair around Windy Hill on minnows and jigs. Still some catfish being caught in the upper Salt River Arm (flows 127 cfs). Water dogs, worms and sunfish/bluegill are the best bait for flatheads. If you catch a flathead catfish with a Game and Fish tag attached to it, please note the weight, length and river location, then call the Game and Fish Dept. at (480) 981-9400 ext. 214 (you can keep the fish). Live baitfish may not be transported above the diversion dam.

Apache - Lake level is at 91 percent. Few reports. Some anglers have been catching good numbers of bass after dark. Several different presentations continue to produce.

Catfishing also remains good for both channel and flathead catfish. Walleye are hitting crankbaits, cicadas and jiggling spoons. A few more yellow bass showing up on minnows and jiggling spoons.

Canyon - Lake level is 96 percent. Trout stockings are scheduled for next week. Look to start fishing large trout baits for monster bass once stockings begin. Catfish bite remains good on shrimp and liver. Cranks and Westys are producing some bass and walleye. Anglers are picking up a few smallmouth up in the river channel. Look for some sporadic topwater bass at first light. Spider jigs and jig n' pigs are also good bets this time of year as fish start to go deep. Try minnows for the yellow bass off the fishing pier. Remember that there is a certified scale at the marina if anglers would like to get an official weight of their fish before releasing it. Go to the marina to find out more about the certified scale. Two witnesses are needed for the weight to be official.

Saguarp - Lake level is 89 percent. Trout stockings are scheduled for next week. Bass fishing has been slower. Start to use electronics to locate fish and try cicadas and jiggling spoons for bass, walleye and yellow bass.

Yellow bass are also hitting minnows and night crawlers. Catfishing has been very good on shrimp and liver. There is still a good topwater bite at times. Pop R's and Ricos have been effective.

Bartlett - Lake level is at 89 percent capacity. Lake began to turn over last week. Bass fishing has been fair. Cranks and jigs are working off main lake points. Look for topwater action throughout the day, especially on overcast days. The crappie fishing continues to be slow. Catfishing is good, mostly in the main lake for channel cats and upstream for flatheads.

Horseshoe - Lake level remains at 1 percent capacity. Fishing is extremely poor above the dam. Anglers have been catching a few bass below the dam.

Remember that the Colorado pikeminnow and the razorback sucker are endangered and must be released immediately. Upstream from Horseshoe Dam is an unlimited harvest area for all game fish.

Verde River (above Horseshoe) - Flows are 113 cfs at Camp Verde and 177 into Horseshoe Lake. Smallmouth and largemouth are hitting tube jigs in the river above Sheep's Bridge. Be aware of rising water levels following storms.

Remember that no baitfish can be trans-

ported into this part of the river.

Lower Salt River (below Saguaro Lake) - The flow is 8 cfs below Stewart Mountain Dam and 125 cfs below Bartlett. No reports. Trout were stocked last week at Phon D. Sutton and Granite Reef. Try Power Bait, worms and spinners.

Upper Colorado River/North Western Waters.

Lake Powell - Lake elevation: 3,661. Water Temperature: 61-63 F. Lingering warm weather has left fish trapped in the transition between fall and winter. Smallmouth bass and stripers remain active but neither are providing consistent action for anglers. Fishing is similar to early spring where storm fronts slow fishing only to have it heat up again a short time later.

Gradually declining water temperatures have changed smallmouth feeding behavior and the way they attack lures. Soft plastic baits that are always the favored bait are more effective now if accompanied by an attractant flash. It seems sluggish bass are more curious about movement if the bait swims steadily. Spinnerbaits, (safety-pin and in-line spinners) especially in the smaller sizes were more effective in Good Hope Bay than plain soft plastic jigs with breezy wind ruffling the water. Dead calm periods made fishing tough with all baits. There were short periods, usually in the afternoon, when standard soft plastic grubs worked well. When bass are reacting normally, fish jigs in a bottom-hopping retrieve. If there is no response to the hopping retrieve then swim the bait very slowly along the bottom. Bass are eating both crayfish and other fish. Those selecting crayfish will respond to the hopping motion while those looking for a fish meal will prefer a steadily swimming bait. Striped bass are migrating in and out of canyons. They remain in a canyon for a day or two and then move on.

When located, the school will likely be laying on the bottom and be difficult to detect on electronics. In Good Hope shad size was large. There were no 2-3 inch shad found. Many five to seven-inch shad were evenly dispersed around Red Canyon and Blue Notch. Most shad were too big for small stripers to eat and certainly too elusive for thin stripers to catch. A marked distinction was found among stripers with a small number that were quick, fat and strong. These stripers were able to boil and catch any shad.

They responded to surface lures and reac-

tion spoons jiggged quickly off the bottom. Small boils were seen at first light on some mornings. After that, fat fish were grouped at 50-70 feet near shad holding locations. They were detectable on the graph but would not always respond. The remaining stripers were not as healthy and unable to catch big shad. These stripers could be caught on bait particularly at night. For effective night fishing, anchor the boat (fore and aft) in 70-80 feet of water at dusk and place a light in or above the water to attract plankton and finally shad. When shad come, stripers will follow. This may take an hour but it is a unique and interesting experience to watch plankton and shad gather in response to the light. Fish bait under the shad for quick fishing. Keep all stripers caught but only fillet those that appear normal. An obviously skinny fish is not good table fare and should be recycled. Down lake stripers are still located in Warm Creek, Gunsight and Dry Rock Creek and provide good catches on anchovy bait most days. For current Lake Powell fishing information:

Lee's Ferry - The predicted flows from Glen Canyon Dam for November are: Mondays through Saturdays, a low of 6,600 cfs (starting late evening and early mornings) to a high of 12,600 cfs (starting in the afternoon). On Sundays, releases will be 6,600 cfs at night (between 7 p.m. and 7 a.m.) rising to 10,100 cfs during the day (between the hours of 7 a.m. and 7 p.m.). The top flies have been black/copper zebra midges, ginger scuds, and Oregon cheese glo-bugs. San Juan worms, woolly buggers, and WD-40's also took a few fish. With the flows for November scheduled to be about the same as October, fishing will hopefully get better as more and more fish get ready to spawn. At the walk-in area, the top flies were ginger scuds, black/copper zebras, and glo-bugs fished on a heavy nymph rig. Woolly buggers stripped through some of the slower water also proved to be somewhat effective. Check out the Lee's Ferry Angler's web site for up to the minute information. Lake Mead - The lake level continues to fluctuate slightly around 1,178 feet. Expensive boat owners should be aware of dangerous launching conditions lake wide however. The launch at Temple Bar is pretty good if you put in on the west side of the dock, and back in perpendicular to the dock.
