

Military Spouse Appreciation Day



Army libraries top family survey of MWR programs

The Department of Army Survey of Army Families IV has rated Army libraries top in importance out of seven Morale, Welfare and Recreation programs and services. The spring 2001 survey results were highlighted at the Army Library Institute recently held in Oklahoma City, Okla.

The U.S. Army Community and Family Support Center reported that 67 percent of families surveyed rated library services as tops in importance. Fitness facilities, child development services, youth services, gymnasium/playing courts/fields, swimming pools and outdoor recreation areas were rated 58, 46, 39, 38 and 35 percent respectively.

peting in events such as the shot put, javelin, discus throw, high jump and long jump.


And of course, there were running events, both short and long distance.
