## Pro bowlers strike it up

The expression of calmness was very evident on Michael Haugen Jr.'s face as he entered Sunday's final round of the Third Annual PBA Western Regional Tournament.

Sporting a commanding 156-pin overall lead over Jim Pratt, Haugen knew his opponent would have to bowl a 300 and he'd have to choke and bowl a 146 or lower to lose.

"I'd already had two top five finishes here, but this is phenomenal," Haugen said after winning the tournament held Friday through Sunday at Desert Lanes.

In the championship match, Pratt despite bowling a near-perfect 286 couldn't overcome Haugen's big lead in the end.

"I just tried to make one shot at a time and use the gutter to my advantage," Haugen said. "Whenever I can roll the ball right close to the edge, that's my strength."

The three-day event gave spectators not only the chance to watch the pros bowl, but also a chance for amateur's young and old alike to bowl with a pro.

"It was very exciting for the fans here," said Randy Carter, manager of Desert Lanes. "There is a big following here and for the fans to bowl with the guys they see on television is a great opportunity."

Carter also mentioned that this is the third consecutive year that Fort Huachuca has been a part of the Professional Bowlers Association tour on way to the big arena championships and he's proud his facility plays a part for the bowlers.

"People don't realize what it takes to get to the level of competition these bowlers are at," Carter said. "There is both a physical and mental challenge to competing in this sport."

Although the event is three days long, two days are actually devoted to competition. Bowlers roll more than 20 games which and all display the mental anguish when they come short of knocking down a strike or spare.

The top five finishers of the tournament were Haugen, 6,445 total pins; Pratt, 6,367 total pins; Marv Sargent, 6,243 total pins; Tim Paul Jr., 6,212 total pins; and Dennis Horan Jr., 6,151 total pins.



# AAFES recalls mountain bike with faulty suspension forks

AAFES release

DALLAS — The Army and Air Force Exchange Service, the U.S. Consumer Product Safety Commission, and Brunswick Corp., of Lake Forest, Ill., are voluntarily recalling about 103,000 Mongoose and Roadmaster mountain bicycles with Ballistic 105 front suspension forks.

The forks on these bicycles can break apart, causing riders to lose control, fall and suffer serious injury.

There have been 34 reports of forks on these bicycles breaking, resulting in 31 riders, including children and teenagers, suffering serious head and bodily injuries, abrasions, bruises and chipped teeth.

AAFES sold the bicycles with these forks from June 1998 through December 2000. Additionally, consumers could have received a Ballistic model 105 fork as a replacement when participating in one of the previous recalls.

Brunswick Corp. is expanding the recall to include all Ballistic model 105 forks sold on the Mongoose and Roadmaster mountain bicycles they manufactured (except the Mongoose A40). The previous recalls were limited to forks with certain serial numbers and were under "By Us International Co." name.

The recall includes only Ballistic 105 forks installed on Mongoose and Roadmaster model bicycles manufactured by Brunswick Corp. The forks on these bikes are black with decals that read "BALLISTIC" and "105" on the sides of the suspension fork legs. A small label on the bottom of the bicycle reads "Brunswick." The forks on the Mongoose A40 model bicycles and forks on bicycles not manufactured by Brunswick Corp. are not included in the recall.

Consumers should immediately stop using these bicycles and call the firm to obtain information on receiving a \$65 refund for the bicycle fork. This applies to all owners of bicycles with

Ballistic model 105 forks manufactured by Brunswick (except the Mongoose A40), even if they received a new Ballistic model 105 fork as a result of participating in a previous recall. For more information, consumers should call Brunswick Corp. at (800) 508-2762 between 8 a.m. and 5 p.m. CT, Mondays through Fridays, or visit the firm's Web site at www.ballisticforkrecall.com. Consumers can also write to the company at the following address: Ballistic Fork Recall, 3125 Commercial Ave., North Brook, IL 60062.

Consumers should include the following information: Color of fork, when and where purchased, bicycle model name and model number. The model number can be found on the white sticker located under the frame by the crank assembly.

Consumers must also include full name and address in order to receive instructions and tools on how to remove and return the fork at no cost and receive a check for \$65.

## Sturdy ladders — a safety must

It must be time to get your evaporative coolers up and running again. At least three people in the last few days have mentioned someone having an accident with a ladder. It happens just about this time every year as folks are either up on the roof, servicing that cooler or up a ladder trimming those trees. So lets take a minute and look at the right ways to use a ladder.

There are several different types of ladders, so choose the right one for the job. Though there are numerous types of ladders,

made of many different materials, there are two basic types that meet most home needs. The straight ladder (either in a single section or extension) and the stepladder. Regardless of the type of ladder there should be a sticker some where on it that says it complies with American National Standards Institute and Underwriters Laboratories standards.

Be sure to always use a ladder that is long and sturdy enough. Aluminum ladders

are lightweight and not effected as much by the weather, but they can be more shaky than wooden or fiberglass ladders and should never be used when working around overhead electrical lines.

Always inspect your ladder before each use. Make sure that the rungs, hinges, bolts and screws are all tight and that the safety feet are still in and functional. This will make the ladder more stable and reduce the risk of a slip or fall.


Next place your ladder safely; avoid heavy traffic areas and lock nearby doors. Make sure the surface is solid and level. Straight ladders should be fully opened and straight ladders should be at a four to one ratio. One foot from wall for every four feet of height. If you are climbing onto a roof or platform make sure the ladder extends at least three feet above the roof surface.

When climbing, always face the ladder and hang on with both hands as you climb. If you need tools attach them to a tool belt or raise and lower them on a hand line. Always check your shoes and ladder rungs for moisture or debris before starting to climb. You can also apply a non-slip coating to the rungs for extra slip-resistance.

Lastly, use common sense. Never stand on the top rung of any ladder. Don't over reach and cause the ladder to tip. Put a barricade around your ladder if you are working in an area where someone might come around a corner and run into it. Use care when moving or store your ladder, don't drop, throw or toss a ladder and store your ladders vertically in the closed position.

Remember, more than 30,000 people are injured each year by falls involving ladders and the National Safety Council says over 6,000 people die from falls in and around the home each year.

So check those ladders before you use them and if you need a new one, get it.



# Black Knights capture eighth men's title; women place second

CENTER VALLEY, Pa. — Army's rapidly improving intercollegiate athletic program took great strides on the competitive "fields of friendly strife" this past academic year. Those steps were reflected in the Black Knights' second place finish in the Patriot League Presidents' Cup standings.

Only Bucknell, with 112 points, topped Army in the 2001-02 academic year. The Black Knights eclipsed the 100-point plateau (103.5) for the first time in five years, improving their placement in all three categories: overall, men's and women's.

Army finished second overall for the fourth time in the last five seasons. It marked the first time that the Black Knights reached 100 points since 1996-97 and was the highest score by Army since it won the title in the 1994-95 school year.

Army is the only program in the Patriot League besides Bucknell to have won the overall crown, taking home the championship on three occasions (1994, 1995, 1997) and finishing second six other times. The Bison topped the league for the fourth consecutive season. Lehigh was third with 91.5 points and newcomer American placed fourth with 87.5. Colgate (77.5), Lafayette (71.5), Navy (63.5) and Holy Cross (61.5) round out the eight-team standings.

On the men's side, the Black Knights captured their eighth title in the last 10 years with their highest point total since the 1996-97 season. Army, which sponsors 10 men's programs that compete in the Patriot League, collected 53 points to outdistance its closest competitors. Bucknell and Lehigh finished second and third, respectively with 51.5 and 50 points each. The Black Knight men won the points race thanks in part to championships in cross country, both indoor and outdoor track & field, golf and lacrosse.

Army's women placed second with 50.5 points, bringing

home their highest finish since a second place showing in 1997-98. The Black Knights, who sponsor nine women's sports that compete in the Patriot League, were 9.5 points off the pace set by Bucknell. American was third behind Army with 45.5 points. The Black Knights won the softball championship and finished second in cross country, both indoor and outdoor track & field and tennis.

President's Cup points are awarded based on a team's performance in the final Patriot League standings. In football and individual sports, such as cross country, swimming & diving and track & field, the points are awarded based on the final team standings. In team sports, such as basketball, field hockey, soccer and volleyball, points are awarded based on a combination of the league championship tournament and regular-season standings (for those that do not qualify for the league championship tournament).
